How does the course work?

The course will be delivered by CMS and partner dioceses. This gives a rich mix of contexts and approaches. There are six module weekends: two experienced pioneer practitioners co-facilitate each module. The modules run from Saturday morning 9am to Sunday 1pm. Learning is hybrid - a mix of online, onsite and streamed over the year. The course is hosted by the local Hub leader and a chaplain offers pastoral care.



What are the dates for the module weekends?

17-19 January, 15/16 March, 10/11 May, 5/6 July, 13/14 September and 15/16 November 2025

Where do modules take place?

The first module will be held at Hilfield Friary in Dorset where all new students can get to know each other in person. Three modules will be streamed. You will be in your local 'hublet' group connected to the other groups via Zoom. One module will be entirely on Zoom from your own home. The final module will be 'in person', location to be confirmed at induction.

How will you evaluate my learning?

We set two tasks after each module. In them we ask you to demonstrate what you've learned in whatever way suits you best. You get positive written feedback on your work and advice on how to extend your thinking or practice.

How do I apply?

Register your interest as soon as possible with Paul Bradbury (details below). If you want to talk to someone first who has done the course he will sort that out for you.

After you apply we will invite you for a conversation with the course leader and representatives of the Church Mission Society so we can discern together if this is the right course for you. If you are accepted there will be an induction session on Sunday December 1st 10am—4pm online. What will I learn?

The course consists of six modules:

- What is pioneer mission?
- The Bible in context
- Doing theology
- Mission spirituality
- Mission ecclesiology
- Pioneering in the rural church

You will be part of a small group where you can grow deeper relationships and a support network. This will meet on two evenings between each module and be facilitated by a pioneer practitioner.

Cost

The cost of the course is £240. This can be paid in installments by module if necessary. Students will also need to take account of travel and accommodation and meal costs, we try and keep these to a minimum as much as possible. Your local church may be willing to contribute.

How can I use what I've learnt?

When you have completed the Certificate you may feel called to be recognised by your local parish or benefice as a Local Lay Pioneer. This means you can pioneer in your local community under the oversight of your church leadership team following a short service of recognition in your local church or deanery.
